

## Complete 1 Requirement

1. Far Out! Learn some cool slang from the 60's and find out what it means. Try to use it in a sentence. Examples include: bummer, groovy, hang ten, dude, cool man, ditch it, or threads. <http://cougartown.com/slang.html>
2. Some of the most popular shows of the 60's are now syndicated. You can also view them on VHS or DVD. Learn more about one of the main characters and their role on a show OR watch one of these shows, act it out, sing the theme song, dress up or create a skit about one of the shows. Examples are I Dream of Jeannie, The Jetsons, The Addams Family, Green Acres, Gilligans Island, The Flintstones, and Bewitched.
3. What was the rave fashion in the 60's? There were different styles in the early 60's and, of course, in the late 60's. Some of these items include: Miniskirts, Go-go boots, Baby doll dresses, 3/4 length sleeves, bellbottoms, hip huggers and Tye-dye. Design your own groovy outfit from the 60's, tye-dye a cool shirt or cut out pictures in magazines that may depict the fashion of the 60's.
4. Get your groove on with some tunes from the 60's. Listen to some music or dance to the beat. Some examples include: The Beatles, The Supremes, Elvis, The Beach Boys, Chubby Checker, and the Woodstock Festival which featured many of the top performers of the late 60's.
5. Common products found in homes in the 60's were bean bag Chairs, lava lamps, beaded curtains placed in windows or doorways, shag carpet, and candles. Design a room from the 60's or explore examples of houses and rooms from that time period.
6. Check out the hairstyles and cosmetics of the 60's. Make-up styles include white or pale lipstick, heavy eyeliner or the natural look. Hairstyles ranged from beehive hair to ironed hair with heavy bangs. Are the hairstyles similar to today? Create a hairstyle from that era of time, roll your hair in curlers, make lip gloss, paint your nails a funky color or give yourself a facial.
7. What type of food or snacks were popular in the 60's? Kool-aid, TV dinners, candy buttons, necklaces and lipstick, chuckles, Apple Jacks, snack cakes, fritos, rice a roni, shake-n-Bake and hamburgers were all examples. Have a taste test of different snacks or foods OR design a cool label for one of the 60's items using slang and colorful displays.
8. Popular games and toys of the 60's included Barbie, G. I. Joe, twister, cootie, sled, view master, spyrograph, etch a sketch, crayons (box of 48) and color forms. How are toys different today? Play with a game or toy from the 60's or create a game similar OR you can play some of the games on the internet <http://accessarts.org/ArtKids/spirograph/>
9. What ever happened to aluminum Christmas trees, icicle tinsel, the milk man, trading stamps, bonnet hair-dryers, and 110 cameras? You can still find some of these items today, but it is not the same as it was then. Find out how technology has changed since the 60's or how an item that was great in the 60's is different today.
10. Accessorize yourself. Vibrant colors, mod flowers, seed bead necklaces, sunglasses, jean purses and headbands were common accessories during the 60's. Decorate your jeans or make a piece of jewelry, headband, flower power purse, or any other fun accessory.
11. Put it all together in a cool journal or book format. Place all information you learned about the 60's such as clothes, slang, TV shows, in book format or display. Add self drawn pictures, clippings from magazines, clip art or website addresses to create a cool project. (Book format and clip art are located in the kit)
12. Peace ! The 60's was the era of time for standing up for what you believe in. Compile a community service project and help others that are less fortunate than you.

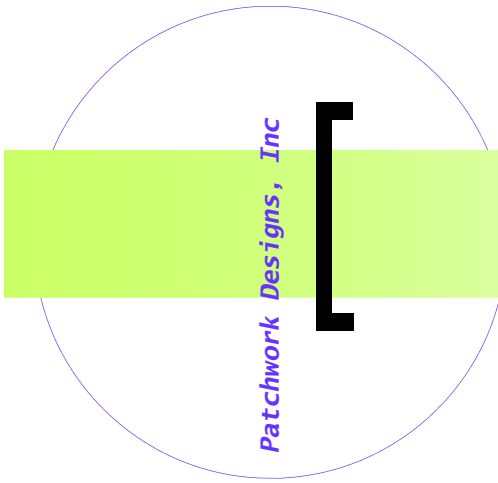

**Groovy Backdrop**- This cool backdrop is fun for far out pictures or decorations.

butcher paper (white or a variety of colors)

tape

scissors

construction paper and glue OR paint and brushes OR sponges and paint

**Optional:** bean bag chair or lava lamp for decorations

**STEP ONE:** Cut the paper length needed to create your backdrop. Repeat these measurements so that you have two pieces. Tape them together. Note you may purchase butcher paper or bulletin board paper in a variety of colors, such as yellow and pink, it is usually available at craft stores or teacher supply stores.



**STEP TWO: (A)** Construction paper process. Use the flower pattern and trace it on several different colors of construction paper. Make sure you use vibrant colors. Space the different sized patterns to make it look like a design. Glue the flowers on the backdrop. OR

**STEP TWO: (B)** Paint and brush process. Use the flower pattern and trace it on the backdrop. Paint the flowers with vibrant acrylic paints. For extra you can outline the flower with markers. OR

**STEP TWO: (C)** Sponges and paint. Use the flower pattern and trace it on a sponge. Cut the sponge into the flower shapes. Dip the sponge in acrylic paints and stamp the design all over the backdrop.

**Display your backdrop for picture taking or a festive decoration. For individual photo shots you may wish to add a bean bag chair or lava lamp. You may also write 60's slang words on the background.**

**Jean Purse**-Make an old pair of jeans into a groovy purse.

old pair of jeans (or jeans found at a thrift shop)

sewing machine or needle and thread

wide ribbon or cord (for the strap)

**Optional decorative items:** bright puffy fabric paints, iron on symbols, buttons, ribbons, decorative trim, material with flowers or decorative designs, (wonder under to apply the material to the purse)



Cut the pocket off the back of an old pair of jeans. Remember to cut about an inch around all edges to ensure you have sewing room. Cut out a piece of jean material the same size for the back side of the purse. You can also just use the leg portion of the jeans to create both sides of the purse using the pocket gives you more storage space in the front of the purse.

Decorate with beads, buttons etc., before you sew the two pieces together.

Place the jean pieces together face to face and sew around three edges, leaving the top portion open. Turn the purse right side out. Measure the length of the strap according to the girl wearing it. Some like to wear it diagonal across the chest, so keep that in consideration. Attach the strap to the purse with a needle and thread.

**How to decorate with wonder under.** Lay the fabric over the wonder under and iron the pieces together. Once the fabric is cool, draw or stencil a design on the paper backing or cut out the design on the fabric. [see above we used a car and van] Position the design coated side down and iron in place on your purse.

**Tie- Dying** [Creative Artistic clothing that was hip in the 60's]

white 100% cotton t-shirts  
 rubber gloves  
 rubber bands  
 Plastic tablecloth or a large garbage bag per participant to place on your lawn  
 tie dye kit [found at your local craft store]  
 old clothes to wear while dyeing



There are several ways to tie-dye a piece of clothing. Start with a white piece of cotton clothing that has been washed at least once. **\*\*CAUTION: Don't work with dyes in or around where food is prepared, or mix dyes with a container or spoon used for eating.\*\***

**Three different design ideas:**

- 1) Take a dowel rod or stick and place it in the middle of a shirt. Twist the rod ever so slightly until the shirt is turned into a complete circle of swirls. Do the same to the sleeves or create another design. Rubber band the circle of the shirt and other areas you have swirled the shirt. Apply the dye as directed on the container.
- 2) Tie rubber bands in different areas of the shirt. Keep in mind the bands must be tight to ensure that the dye doesn't seep through to areas that you would like to stay white. Apply dye as directed.
- 3) Twist, turn and bind the shirt in different areas and designs. Secure the design with rubber bands. Apply dye as directed on the container.

For a variety of colors on your shirt, use the squeeze or spray bottle method. Mix your dye as directed. Saturate the area where you would like that color and continue this method with other colors. Place item in a gallon ziploc bag sealed tight for at least 24 hours. Wash garment in the washer alone in cold water until all colors run clear. Toss it in a dryer to set the colors. NOTE: Do not wash with other shirts due to the dye bleeding on other clothing.

**Groovy Headbands** Accent your outfit with a totally groovy headband.

fabric in vibrant colors or bright floral patterns  
 scissors

Cut about 1 1/2 inch wide piece of fabric about 36 inches to 45 inches in length. Tie the fabric around your head. Groovy !

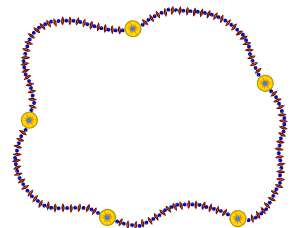


**Candy Necklaces** can be purchased at local stores. You can also create a candy necklace by purchasing a candy necklace kit, found at local toy and craft stores.

**Beaded Necklaces** can be made in various sizes and colors.

beads (seed or pony)  
 String (long enough to pull over your head)  
 Scissors

Cut the string the desired length. Make sure you can get it over your head without un-tying it. String the beads on using a pattern of your choice. Vibrant colors are always nice.



Don't forget to leave some room for a knot at the end!  
 Tie a square knot at the end and slide it over your head.

## Groovy Cake or Cupcakes

Prepackaged Cake Mix  
 (ingredients needed for mix)  
 White Frosting  
 Food coloring to dye frosting  
 Black frosting in a tube  
 Optional: colorful chocolate candies and frosting in a tube

Prepare the cake mix according to the package in two nine inch circle pans. Optional: Create cupcakes and decorate each one with a different symbol or let the participants decorate their own cupcakes.

### Four different design ideas:

**Smiley Face Cake:** [white frosting, yellow food coloring, and black frosting in a tube]  
 Color the frosting yellow. Frost the cake entire cake yellow. Using the black frosting add a smiley face to the top of the cake.



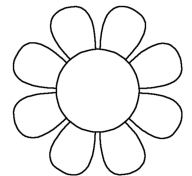
**Peace Sign Cake:** [white frosting, food coloring, and black frosting in a tube]  
 Color the frosting a vibrant color of your choice. Frost the cake entire cake the vibrant color. Using the black frosting draw a peace sign on the cake.



**Yin Yang Cake:** [white frosting, food coloring, and black frosting in a tube]  
 Color the frosting a vibrant color of your choice. Frost the cake entire cake the vibrant color. Using the black frosting draw the ying yang symbol on the cake.



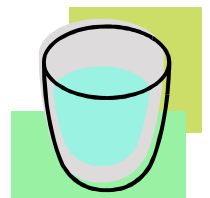
**Flower Cake:** [white frosting, food coloring, and black frosting in a tube]  
 Color the frosting a vibrant color of your choice. Frost the cake entire cake the vibrant color. Using the black frosting draw flowers on top of the cake in various sizes. Optional: Use candies for the center of the flowers. A template is located in the back of this kit for the flower.



## Groovy Drinks

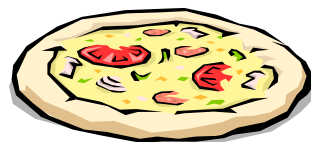
Lemon Lime Soda [introduced in 1961]  
 Vibrant colors of flavored drink mix [lime, cherry, and orange]

Pour a cup of soda and place a sprinkle of flavored drink mix and stir. If needed, continue to place the color in the soda until you get the color you desire. Serve your groovy drink.



## Homemade Pizza

Premade pizza crust [introduced in 1961]  
 Pizza sauce  
 Mozzarella cheese  
 Variety of toppings



Place the sauce on the pizza crust. Place the cheese and the pineapple chunks on the pizza. Add any other toppings that you desire. Cook according to the package directions.

**Tacos**

1 pound of turkey or ground beef  
 Taco seasoning packet [introduced in 1967]  
 lettuce  
 Cheddar cheese  
 Taco shells  
 Any additional toppings



Wash and clean lettuce. Chop it into thin slices. Set aside in a bowl.

Place turkey or ground beef in a large skillet over medium heat. Cook until it is evenly browned. Drain and discard an excess grease. Place seasoning package mixture in the meat. Add 1/4 cup water and stir until well blended over low heat. Place a spoonful of meat in the taco, add cheese and other toppings. Top with chopped lettuce and serve. Serve with chips. [introduced in 1969]

**Raggedy Ann Salad-** [Served at home for kids lunch]

Lettuce  
 Hard boiled eggs  
 Celery  
 Canned peaches [half]  
 American cheese  
 Maraschino cherries  
 Raisins



Place the peach half in the center of a small plate smooth side up. Use the lettuce for the skirt, tucking in underneath the peach 1/2 to create a ruffled skirt. Peel the hard boiled egg and cut it in half. Place the boiled egg, white side up, above the peach to create the head. Cut celery in half and cut it into 4 small sticks and position them as the arms and legs. Making sure the legs are placed under the lettuce. Take one slice of American cheese and cut it into thin strips. Place the cheese on the boiled egg for hair. Cut the cherry in half and place it on the egg for the mouth. Position the raisins for eyes, nose, and shoes. Finish by placing two buttons on top of the peach for buttons.

## Groovy Relay Race (other items can be added or substituted to add more fun)

Sunglasses  
Large tie dye shirt  
Long beaded necklace  
Flip flops or sandals  
Headband



Make two teams into two lines. Make sure the lines are about 2-3 feet apart to ensure the items don't get mixed up. Place the above items about 4 feet from the start line. On "go" each participant must run to the pile of items and place them on as soon as possible. It is easier if they place the shirt on before the necklace. After all the items are placed on. Then they must yell "Groovy!" Then she takes off her groovy gear, puts it back into the pile, and jogs to tag the next person in line. Continue the process until everyone on the team has completed the relay race. As a person completes the relay, they need to move to the end of the line and either squat down or sit down. The team that finishes first wins.

## Scavenger Hunt [There are several different ways to plan this hunt, inside or outside. You should choose according to the age level or space.]

**Option 1:** Write names of slang words from the 60's on index cards and hide them around the area.

**Option 2:** Hide actual items from the 60's. Provide a list for the participants to find the items and a plastic bag to gather the items.

**Option 3:** Hide plastic eggs with a picture of an item from the 60's inside. (Use the Bingo pieces located in this kit to place in the egg) Use vibrant colored plastic eggs and optional decorate them with flower stickers.



### **Option 4: Scavenger hunt more challenging or for older participants. \***

Divide them in teams and lead them on a mystery hunt. Leave clues in every place until they find the tie dye shirt or groovy item at the end. First one to find the item wins. It works great with plastic eggs also, hiding the clues in each one and teaches the participants to work as a team. \*To gather the plastic eggs or items you may wish to issue plastic grocery bags with the team name on the bag.

## Fashion Show

Have participants dress in clothing from the 60's. Some items can be found at stores or local thrift stores. They can also create or decorate items to wear in the fashion show. [Examples listed below]

Peace sign, tie dye, or rock band shirts  
Wide belts or flare buttons with catchy phrases or symbols  
Bell bottoms, turtlenecks, crocheted vests, and mini skirts



## Get Your Groove On!

Music and players  
Person to turn the music on and off



Turn the music on and everyone begins to dance. When the music stops, everyone is supposed to freeze in place. The person that is in charge of the music, eliminates anyone that moves after the music is turned off.

Switch up the music and choose songs that are from the 60's era. The last person on the floor wins. You can play this game as many times as you wish.

## Groovy Memory Game Finders Keepers was a popular board game in the 60's.



16 cups that you can not see through  
 16 items [paired into 8 sets] [you can use the bingo calling cards or foam shapes]  
 4-6 players

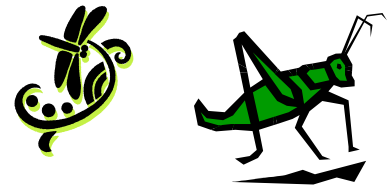
Have an adult set up the game without the participants viewing them. Place all the cups upside down on a table. Make sure you have eight different sets of items to place under the cups. The object is to find the match and capture the pair.

When it is the players turn, they choose to pick up two different cups to try and make a match. If they do not make a match, then they need to place the cups back on the table face down. This is a memory game so the players have to remember if the cup has been lifted or not or where certain items are. As pairs are made the cups are removed and stacked on the side of the table.

At the end of the game, the items are counted and the person with the most pairs wins. items.

## Insect Toss Game [Ants in the Pants was a popular game in the 60's.]

Foam shaped insects, 10 for each player [Each player is a different insect]  
 Tape or marked area to toss from  
 Bowl



Divide the insects into piles. Give each player 10 insects to toss. Make sure each player has a different color or insect. Place the large bowl on the floor. About 2 feet from the door, place a piece of masking tape for the marker of the toss line. Line the players up behind the line. Each player tries to toss all of their insects into the bowl, then the next player is up. After everyone has had a turn then you take the bowl and dump it on the table. The player with the most insects in the bowl wins.

## Groovy Twist

Contact paper  
 4 different colors of colored cardstock [6 pieces of each color]  
 Scissors and markers  
 Plastic shower curtain liner  
 Clear packing tape  
 Designs for the game board [located in the back of the manual]



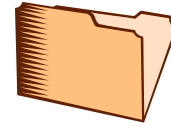
Choose 4 different colors of cardstock or construction paper. Recommended designs and colors: White, ying-yang pattern; yellow, smiley face; orange, peace sign; and pink, for the flower. Another option is to copy them on white cardstock and color each item with markers. You will need 6 pieces of paper of each color. After you have copied the patterns cut them out in circles. Place them in rows of six spaced evenly apart. You may want to mark small X's where you should place the pattern.

Pre cut squares of clear contact paper, enough to cover the circle face with at least a 1 inch edge around all the sides. Peel back the contact paper removing the entire back. Place the pattern face down in the center of the precut square of contact paper. Flip it over and secure it on the shower curtain. To ensure that the pattern stays secure on the plastic curtain, place plastic packing tape all around the edges of the contact paper once it is on the shower curtain.

**Note:** Once the participants start sliding on the game board sometimes the contact paper tends to curl on the edges, therefore we suggest that you use packing tape to secure it in place.

Everyone takes off their shoes and plays the game with socks on. To play the game the adult calls out random suggestions. Left foot flower, right hand peace, etc. If a person falls they are out of the game. The last one is the winner.

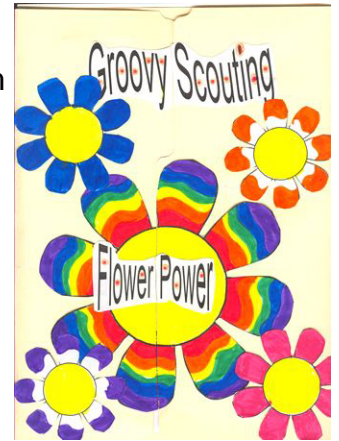
Create a "Groovy Days !" book using a file folder. FUN FOR ALL AGES !!



**Step One: Prepare** Copy all the templates and booklet pages for each participant. Have them color where needed and cut along the outside lines. Folding instructions are included on each page. **They should complete only one booklet at a time.**

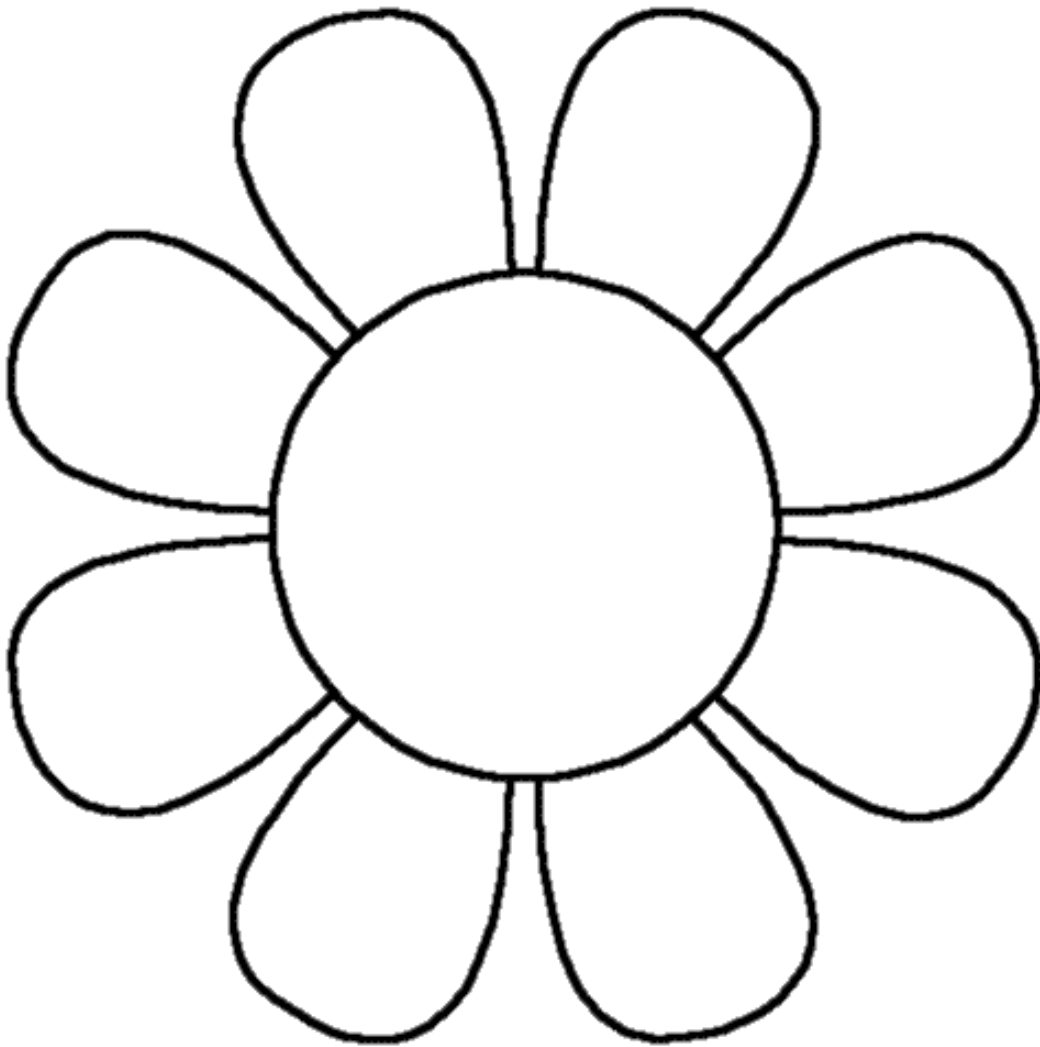
**Step Two: Gather your supplies** Participants will need glue sticks to mount the templates or booklets on the file folder. A stapler will be needed to staple the "Groovy" flip book together. Younger participants may need assistance.

**Step Three: Create the cover** Fold the file folder inwards (in thirds) to form a book (shown below). Younger participants will need assistance. Using the Templates or craft projects located in this kit to decorate the cover of their book. They can also accent the cover with other items that they would wish to draw on there. Make sure they place their name on the front of the book.

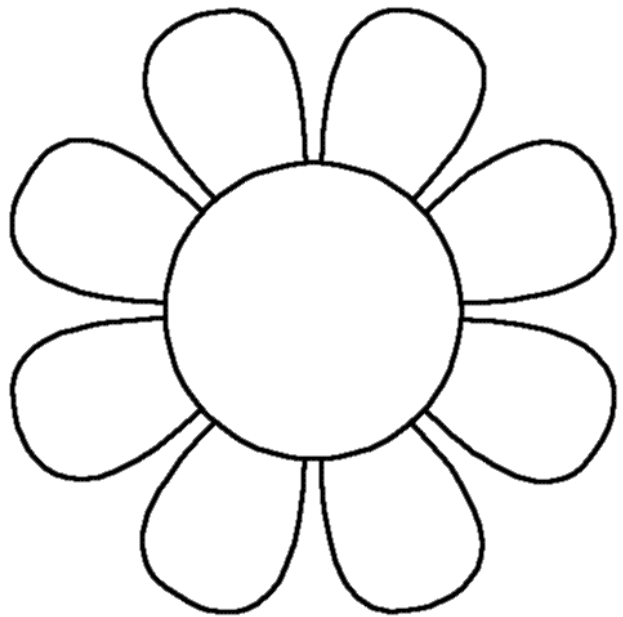
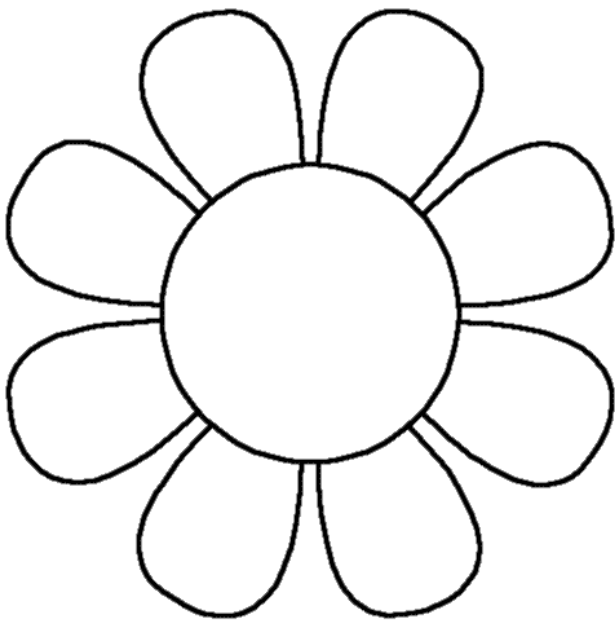


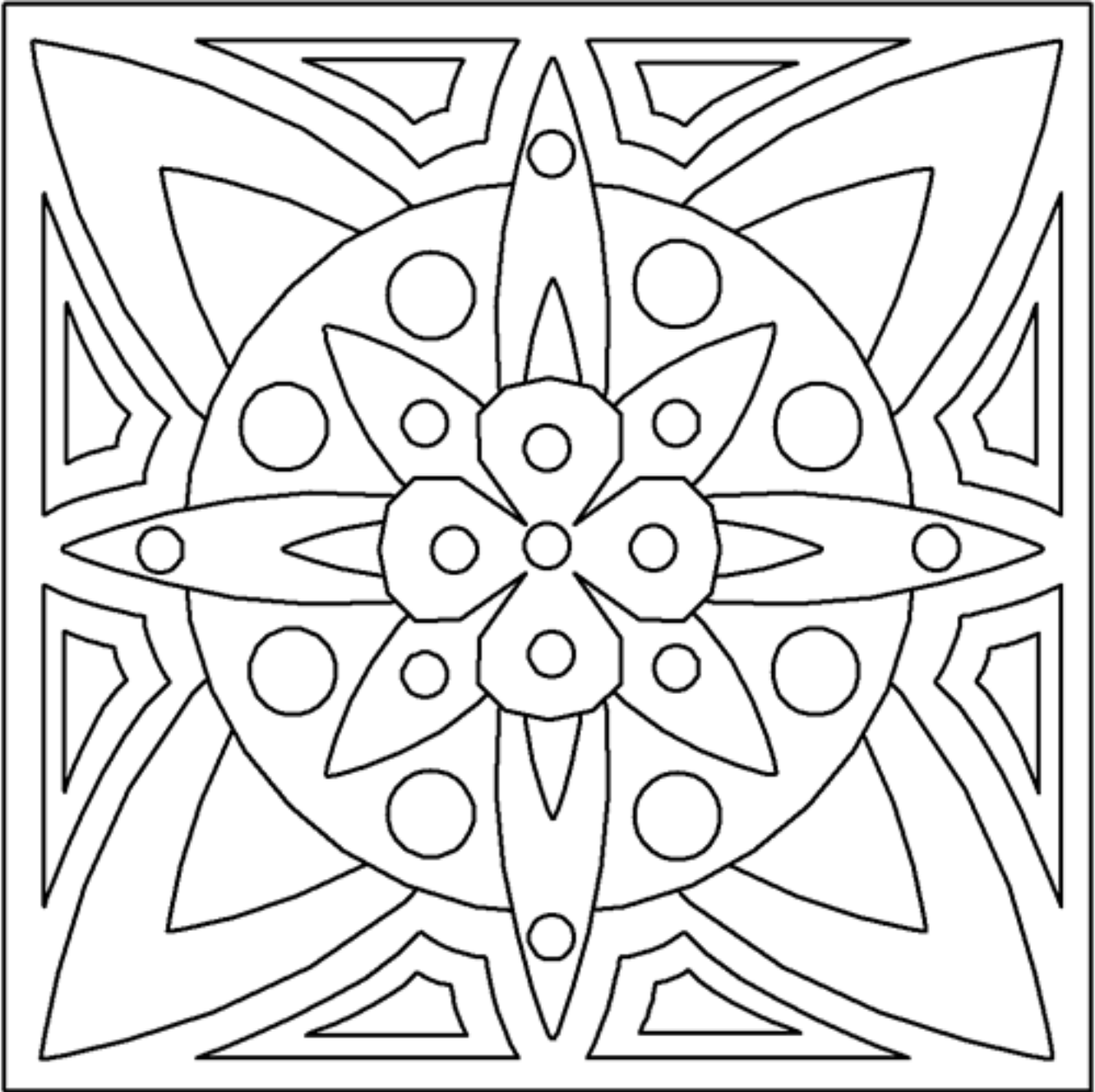

### Glittery Lip Gloss

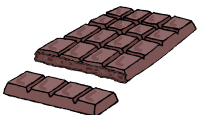
1 tablespoon of petroleum jelly  
1/4 teaspoon of loose powder eye shadow  
Sprinkle of loose body glitter to add shine  
Toothpick or plastic spoon to stir the mixture  
Container or ziploc bag to place the lip gloss in



Using a plastic spoon, place the petroleum jelly in the container or mini ziploc bag. Place the loose eye shadow in the container. Different colored eye shadow makes the tint of the gloss change. Stir the items together in the container with a coffee stirrer or strong toothpick. If you are using a bag keep the items together in a small corner of the bag while you massage the dry items in the jelly. **EXPERIMENT!** Add the petroleum jelly, powder and glitter until it gets the color you desire.

### Chocolate Lip Gloss

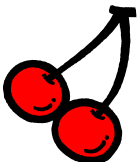
2 tablespoons of petroleum jelly

Aloe vera gel (enough to place in container)  
loose body glitter (A little glitter goes a long way)  
Plastic or Styrofoam bowl used for mixing  
Plastic spoon  
Container to place the body gel in



Place the aloe vera in the bowl. Add a pinch of glitter, stir. Continue this process until the body gel is glittery enough for your personality. Give yourself a glow by placing it on arms, legs etc. Do not place near eyes.

### Orange Slushy

1/2 can of 12 oz frozen orange ( or small can)  
1/2 cup of sugar  
1 cup water

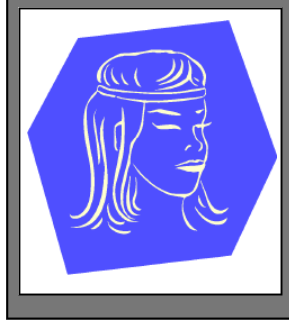
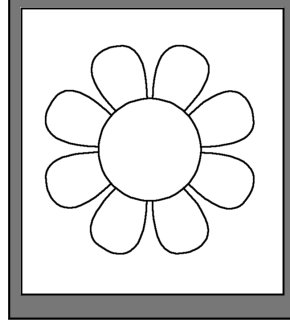
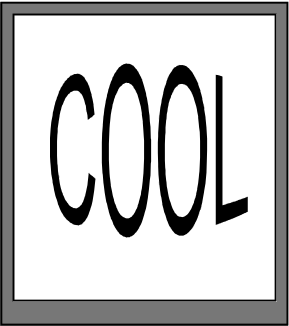
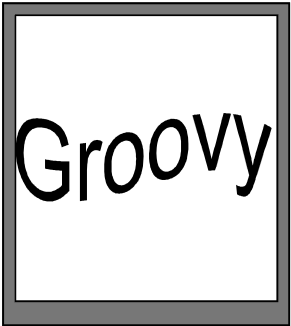
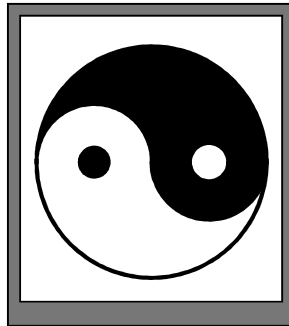
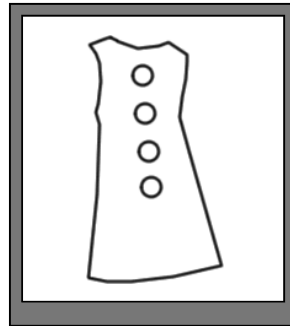
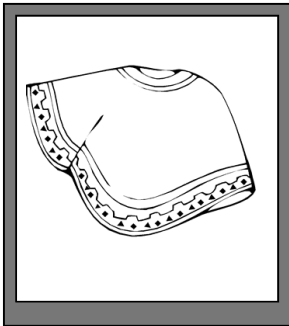
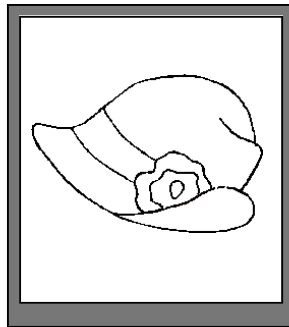
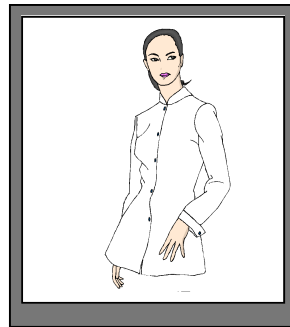
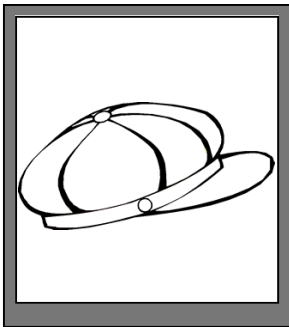
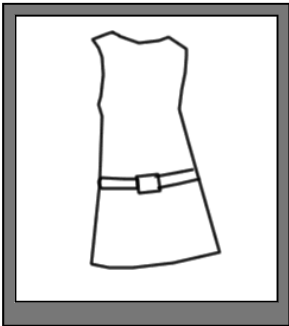
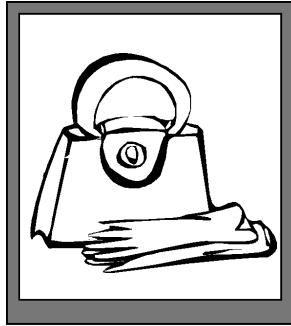
# GROOVY BINGO-Calling Cards

- **Items Needed:** Bingo Cards, Calling Cards, and foam shapes or pennies to mark the squares.
- Copy the Groovy Bingo Cards for each child plus the calling cards. Cut out all the calling cards and place them in a paper bag or container.
